What is it?

*Temperature tells us how
hot or cold something is.*




- *Temperature is measured in degrees*

- *The symbol for degrees is*



- *$100^{\circ} = 100 \text{ degrees}$*


- 
- *The scale we measure temperature in is called 'Celsius' or 'Centigrade'*
 - *It was named after the scientist who developed it.*
 - $23^{\circ}\text{C} = 23 \text{ degrees celsius}$





- Our normal body temperature is 37°C
- Water freezes at 0°C ...
this is called 'freezing point'
- Water boils at 100°C ...
this is called 'boiling point'


