
9AM - 9.30: PE

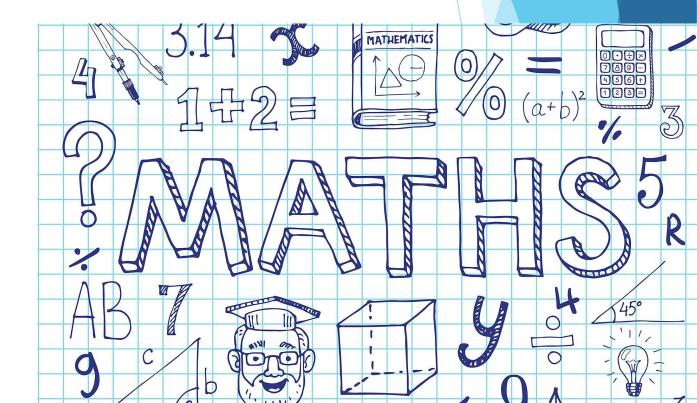






Sentence Stacking Lesson 3


All of a sudden, rain plummeted from the sky.

Model

Start with a 'sudden' adverbial and include a powerful verb for the falling rain.



Initiate



Sentence Stacking Lesson 3

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Personify the rain with human actions that suggest it was 'trapping' the boy - imprisoned, detained, held him captive, confined him, held him against his will, stubbornly blocked his path, refused to let him move.

Look at the image. How must the boy be feeling here?



Model

Sentence Stacking Lesson 3

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It trapped the boy and refused to let him move.

Personify the rain with human actions that suggest it was 'trapping' the boy - imprisoned, detained, held him captive, confined him, held him against his will, stubbornly blocked his path, refused to let him move.



Initiate

Discuss the rain calming down and gather synonyms for 'eased' - subsided, abated, diminished, faded, waned. Sentence Stacking Lesson 3

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<u>Collect feelings the boy might</u> <u>have now</u> - relieved, thankful, grateful, optimistic, comforted, gleeful, free, unhindered, excited.




Model

Sentence Stacking Lesson 3

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Provided sentence: Relentless rods of rain fell for what seemed like hours.

Teacher model: As it finally eased, the boy felt both relieved and excited.

Use a synonym for 'eased' and include two feelings in the main clause.

STEP 4: APPLY NEW WORD TO A SENTENCE

<u>Topic: 1:15 - 2:15</u>
