
Remember to read your independent reading book aloud to a grown up <u>at</u> <u>least 3 times a week.</u>

This story is set in WW2 and is filled with mystery from the very beginning. The main character gets evacuated (and ends up living in a lighthouse) after a bomb explosion lands her in hospital. I can barely put this book down it is so good! She is trying to solve the mystery of her sister, who disappeared the night of the bomb explosion - is she a spy?
