The Music Curriculum - Core
<p>At Kislingbury CE Primary music is taught weekly by class teachers/HLTA from reception to year 6. Each class has a one-hour lesson per week including the whole school Hymn Worship, with children working as a whole class or in small groups</p> <p>In Reception music is taught weekly in 20 minute lessons from Charanga alongside weekly Hymn Worships. The music area is a permanent area of the outside continuous provision allowing the children to experiment with instruments and implement what they have been learning in lessons.</p> <p>Planning is based on Charanga ensuring our planned curriculum matches the scope and ambition of the Model Music Curriculum: 2021 – the curriculum map for music can be found on our school website. During half terms that classes have preparation for class performances including KS1 Nativity and the Year 6 Leaver’s Play, the music lessons will consist of learning to sing the songs from the productions. Content is adapted and scaffolded so that it meets the needs of our school and to ensure that all children are able to access the curriculum.</p> <p>Our music lessons are taught using the same quality first teaching principles that we use across all other curriculum areas, based on the Rosenshine Principles. Within music, planning also identifies:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Musical elements to be addressed</li> <li>• Key vocabulary</li> <li>• Background information and teaching tips</li> <li>• Assessment opportunities.</li> </ul> <p>The whole programme of musical education focuses on practical music making for all, through singing, performing and associated listening, appraising and compositional tasks. To ensure a broad, high quality and progressive listening diet there is a listening programme for KS2 and KS1 materials which have been selected from a wide range of high-quality music encompassing many cultures and historical periods.</p> <p><b>First Access</b></p> <p>Kislingbury CE Primary has a close relationship with NMPAT which underpins our First Access offer, ensuring that all our children have the opportunity to play a musical instrument as they</p>

move through the school. We want to our children to know the enjoyment, self-achievement, interest and understanding of playing an instrument:

- Each year, Rockingham Class (Year 4 and 5) has a 10 week learning block with NMPAT leaders. In 2025 it will be 'Samba', but previously they have learned recorder, clarinet and drums.

These experiences provide opportunities for children to understand notation; engage and play a range of instruments which they may wish to pursue on an individual basis. The children also use these instruments for performances and in weekly class music lessons when appropriate.

Kislingbury CE Primary is a member of the national Music Mark association in recognition of a commitment to providing high quality music education.

Kislingbury CE Primary recognises that Music can play an especially important role in the development and well-being of children with SEND. We therefore:

- Encourage all children with Special Educational Needs are to express themselves through music.
- Ensure that any interventions are not timetabled in a way that prevents SEND pupils accessing the music curriculum.
- Adapt instruments, where needed, to allow all to participate fully in musical tasks and/or focus on those instruments that are easier to manipulate.
- Work with specialists to meet the needs of children with hearing impairments.
- Adapt other resources according to need, e.g. large print for lyrics and xylophone labels for children with visual impairments.
- Provide ear defenders if needed.

### The Music Curriculum – Additional Opportunities

#### Instrument Lessons

Peripatetic music teachers offer lessons in:

- Woodwind
- Piano
- Upper Strings
- Guitar

These lessons are held within school hours and monitored by the Music Curriculum Leader. The lessons have to be paid for by parents / guardians but the pupil premium can be used to enable disadvantaged pupils to access them if they choose. Instruments are available on loan from the music service for any child wanting to participate in these lessons. An annual report is written by the peripatetic teachers and parents can request a meeting to discuss their child's progress.

Details on applying for these lessons are sent out to parents/guardians on a regular basis and further information can be found on our school website.

During this meeting the music specialist seeks to encourage instrument playing by showcasing instruments and outlining terms and conditions for these lessons. Children are encouraged to play these instruments in ensembles, weekly class music lessons and performances when opportunities arise.

### Extra-Curricular Activities

Children have opportunities to take part in free extracurricular activities at lunchtime or after school, including:

- School choir.
- Performing Arts Club (acting and singing)

The school has a positive working relationship with NMPAT and actively encourages children to join one of the local Music and Arts Centres.

### Musical Experiences

Children at Kislingbury CE Primary have many varied opportunities to perform, experience and engage in musical experiences as they move through the school. These include:

- Young Voices performance at Birmingham Resorts World Arena in the Spring Term
- The Big Sing for all year 4 children in the summer term at the Dergate Theatre
- School productions – harvest, remembrance, Christingle, carol service, nativity production, Easter performance, leavers events.
- Christmas pantomime for all year groups to watch at the theatre
- Morning music – planned programme of entrance music which is used at the beginning of every day which reflects a range of genres and eras. Music is also then used as entrance or exit music in worship. Children are introduced to the artist or genre of the week.

### Future Plans

During the 2024/25 academic year, name of school, is intending to extend and deepen its offer in music by:

- A school ensemble, band or group
- Ensure children taking peripatetic instrument lessons have consistent opportunities to use them in music lessons

Within the next three years we aim to:

- Access lessons across a range of instruments, and voice
- Opportunity to enjoy live performance at least once a year in school for all year groups
