

<u>BOOK TALK – THE NOWHERE EMPORIUM</u> <u>WEEK 2</u>

GOOD READERS ASK THEMSELVES QUESTIONS ABOUT THE TEXT AS THEY READ

•NEXT STEP: I'd like you to start asking yourself questions about the writer's choices. Either jot down/say your questions as you read the following bit of text aloud to your grown up.

Model: I'll jot down some of the questions I asked myself, as a model after the questions slide. "How did you get in here? We're closed!"

The voice startled Daniel. In the far corner of the room, stood a grand desk with feet carved like an eagle's talons. Behind the desk sat a small man in a dusty suit. His wavy brown hair was wild and tangled, falling over his handsome face. On the desk in front of the man lay a battered book. His hand hovered over an open page, clutching a fountain pen. He stared at Daniel his eyes the colour of thunderclouds.

"Sorry," said Daniel. "Didn't mean to bother you. Someone's chasing me." As he spoke, his eyes were drawn to the book on the desk, which had begun to tremble against the dark grain of the wood, as if there was something in the pages trying to get out.

The man in the suit frowned. He glanced from Daniel to the book and back. Then he snapped the book shut, locked it away in his desk, and got up and marched past Daniel to the door.

"See," he said, pointing to a sign hanging on the door that read CLOSED. "Closed." He tried the door handle, opened the door. "I could have sworn I locked it." He spun back to face Daniel, staring at him through narrowed eyes. "Who's after you?"

KEY QUESTIONS:

1) Vocabulary: What does the world 'startled' mean?

2) Retrieve: What do you think the man was doing before Daniel entered?

3) <u>True or False: The book is an important item in the story</u>. Use the text to support your response.

4) Inference: Do you think the man locked the door? Explain why/why not.

5) What are the feelings of the man in the extract? How do you know? Use the text to support your response.

<u>QUESTIONS I ASKED MYSELF AS I READ THE</u> <u>EXTRACT</u>

• Why did the writer choose to compare the desk's feet to eagle's talons?

My thoughts: Eagles are birds of prey – so quite dangerous creatures. Is there danger here? They also seem like grand, majestic birds. Does the writer want us to feel in awe of the place/man we are introduced to. Talons are sharp – is the man 'sharp?'

• Why was the man's suit dusty?

This makes me think of something old and worn out. Is this a reflection of the man? Is he old and worn out?

• Why were his eyes described as the colour of thunderclouds?

Thunderclouds are angry. Is the man angry that Daniel came in? Or is he angry about something else?

• Why does the author draw our attention to the book? Is it magical?

This book must be important as the author has clearly drawn our attention to it. Perhaps it is also magical as it 'trembled.' Books don't normally tremble!




NOW USE THE MODEL TO WRITE YOUR OWN DESCRIPTION:

PROVIDED SENTENCES: Here is the last part of this chunk, which I will give you.



Look at the three designs on the following slides and decide which one you like (you may also invent a design of your own). Note down, the lengths of each side and ensure you have enough material for your intended sizes.




Purse or wallet


Make up a paper model of your purse / wallet design. Ask for an adult's help to staple it together.

Making a model will help you to think through the order of your work when you begin to use your chosen materials. The staples are where you will sew the components together when you make your actual purse or wallet.












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



























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You should now have a folded paper model of how your purse will look, stapled together (if possible) to show where the stitches will go.


