



INITIATE — NON-FINITE CLAUSES

- Ing clauses (non-finite clauses) can be used to vary your sentence openers...as we know it is boring when all of our sentences begin in the same way.
- They are non-finite because the verb does not signal tense.
- Usually part of a subordinate clause, so needs a main clause to support it.
- We often use a non-finite clause when the subject is the same in both the main (makes sense on its own) and subordinate (doesn't make sense on its own) clause.

E.g. Staring towards the water, Luca spotted a glowing orb appear from below the horizon.

- -In the example sentence, 'staring towards the water' is not a complete sentence. This makes it a subordinate clause as it cannot be used on its own.
- -Both clauses have Luca as the subject (Luca is staring/and spotted the moon)

1ST SENTENCE STACK: NOTICING LENS



Staring in wordless silence, Luca gazed up at his Papa and Grandpa - both solemn faced. Suddenly, Luca noticed his Papa gently scratch his moustache-covered nose. He mirrored this gesture by slowly bring his hand up to his own nose.

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
1.15 - 2.15: DT


