
Sentence Stacking.

In these English lessons we will be using sentences stacking to write our own story, over the next 2 weeks, based on the pictures and ideas from 'The shark in the Dark.' by Peter Bently.

We use sentence stacking at school and so the children are used to doing this.

In each session you will be given a picture or sentence from the story to generate ideas from. I will the provide a modelled sentence for that part of the story and then the children write their own sentence using the sentence starter or adapting it where needed.

The children will only write 2 or 3 sentences each day which will build up to form the story.


