VE Day: Victory in Europe Day

 Tomorrow, Britons are having a special Bank Holiday to celebrate 75 years since the end of World War II (8th May 1945).

 Today, we will be learning about VE day and preparing for the celebrations tomorrow. Hopefully, you'll be able to use your baking skills to make a delicious cake for your family.

Victory in Europe



Victory in Europe Day/VE Day took place on May 8th 1945. It was a public holiday and day of celebration to mark the defeat of Germany by the Allied forces in Second World War.

VE Day marked the formal conclusion of the war with Germany and brought to an end six years of suffering, courage and endurance across the world.



Time to Celebrate



- People ran out on to the streets, hanging bunting and banners and dancing.
- Church bells pealed across the country to share the news: peace in Europe!
- Everyone brought out food to share at street parties.







Time to Celebrate



- The capital city, London, was the place to be on VE Day.
- Anyone who could reach the city did so.
- The centre of London was full of people wearing red, white and blue, waving flags, dancing and singing.
- Fireworks filled the sky with flashes of light.

"The German War is at an end."



- On VE Day, everyone, both in London and at home sitting by their wireless sets, wanted to hear just one man: Winston Churchill.
- At 3pm the Prime Minister broadcast to the nation: the war was over.
- Tomorrow, at 3pm, Churchill's speech will be broadcast on the BBC. Remember to watch this.

- Crowds gathered in Trafalgar Square and up The Mall.
- They were waiting for Winston Churchill and King George VI to make an appearance on the balcony of Buckingham Palace.

"This is your victory!"




• It was to be the first of eight appearances by the King and Queen on VE Day.

- Shortly after Churchill's speech, King George VI, Queen Elizabeth and the two princesses came out onto the balcony at Buckingham Palace.
- Churchill told the crowds: "This is your victory!"

DT: Bake a cake/treats for tomorrow's VE day celebrations

Here are some ideas (I've also attached the chocolate cake recipe we used for our DT project on the next slide). However, this will all depend on the ingredients you have available.

- Classic Victoria sponge
- Scones (cherry are my favourite!)
- Carrot cake
- Battenberg (if you are feeling adventurous)
- Lemon drizzle
- Traditional fruit cake/loaf

Chocolate Cake Recipe

Ingredients:

- 220g (8oz) butter
- 220g (8oz) caster sugar
- 4 large eggs
- 220g (8oz) self-raising flour (sifted)
- 1tsp baking powder
- 2tbsp of cocoa powder

Equipment:

- Measuring scales
- 2x bowls
- 1 small jug/bowl
- Teaspoon
- Tablespoon
- Fork
- Wooden spoon
- Metal spoon
- 2x tins
- Greaseproof paper

Method:

1) Before you begin, pre-heat the oven to gas mark 3, 170 C (325 F)

2) To complete your preparation, grease and line the


tins with greaseproof paper
3) Firstly, cream the butter and sugar together until you get a fluffy mixture, which drops off the spoon easily.
4) In a separate jug/bowl, beat the eggs thoroughly before adding (a little at a time) to the butter/sugar mixture. TOP TIP: Adding the eggs too quickly will make the mixture curdle so make sure you add only a little at a time, stirring after each addition. 5) Meanwhile, measure out the flour, baking powder and cocoa powder, sifting into a separate bowl. 6) Using a metal spoon preferably, fold the flour into the mixture. The final mixture should 'drop off the spoon easily.'

7) Now, divide the mixture equally between the two tins.

8) Finally, bake in the centre shelf of the oven for 35-40mins.


